Austin Metro Area Asian Population and Government Contracting Resources Overview

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I. Introduction

In 2005, Asian contractor Association (ACA) prepared a publication entitled "Asian Reference Guide for Contractors and Industries." (Reference 1, ACA). This document provides a variety of information, including but not limited to Asian population demographics, Asian business resources, procurement descriptions, and Asian-contractor related data. After ten (10) years, this information has had significant change. The current publication describes this change and the additional data that can be useful to contractors, industries, and government agencies.

The term of contracting businesses or contractors used in this publication are engineers, architects, constructors, and other professionals and nonprofessionals participating in businesses which mainly provide services or commodities to and contracted with the public and private entities. Asians are those defined by the recent US Census reports (Reference 2, US Census Bureau), including Asian Indians, Chinese, Filipinos, Japanese, Koreans, and other Asians such as Cambodians, Laos, Pakistanis, Thai, Taiwanese, etc. "MSA" refers to "Metro" or "Metropolitan Statistical Area." "Austin MSA" or "Metro" generally consists of an area of five (5) counties, namely Bastrop, Caldwell, Hays, Travis, and Williamson Counties.

This publication covers the following listed subjects:

- Demographics of Asian populations in Texas and in the Austin, Texas Metro area.
- Data and characteristics of Asian contracting businesses in Austin, Texas Metro area.
- Essentials on how to respond to procurement or how to obtaining and securing a project.
- Information about agencies, organizations, and the related resources which can assist minority contractors in pursuing a project or business.
- Other data that are pertaining to contractors and their related parties.

This document is part of a series of technical publications prepared by Asian Contractor Association. The purpose of this publication is to assist Asian and other minority contractors in pursuing and developing their businesses. The specific objectives of this publication are:

- 1. Demonstrate the availability and characteristics of Asian work force as well as Asian vendors or contractors in the Austin, Texas Metro area.
- 2. Provide data and information to assist minority vendors and/or contractors in participating and conducting a contracted business or project.
- 3. Enhance communications and the better use of available resources by various contractors and the organizations and/or industries.

II. Demographics of Asian Population in the Austin, Texas Area

In the past thirty-five (35) years, population in the Austin, Texas area has grown in a dramatic manner (Figure 1). The City of Austin (COA) is now the eleventh largest city of the United States by population (Reference 3, US Census Bureau). For the same token, Asian population has been growing even faster, as shown in Figure 2. According to the estimates of the City of Austin Administration of 2016 (Reference 4, COA), the Austin City (within the City limits) and the Austin Metro have populations of 926,426 and 2,050,311, respectively. Table 1 lists the numbers of Asian populations of the past five periods for the same two areas. There were only several thousands of Asians living in the Austin metro area. Up to 2015, Asian population has increased up to more than one hundred thousand. In the mid 1990's, The City Council of Austin has passed a resolution to recognize Asians as an official minority and set up an employment goal of three (3) percent for Asians. Austin has had also established various procurement goals for Asian contractors and/or businesses. Therefore the City of Austin is now the only governmental agency in Texas that it recognizes Asians as an official minority for employment as well as the procurement or purchasing.


The origins of Asians, like other major minorities, are diversified. Chinese Americans are the first one settled in Austin. Then many other races such as Vietnamese, Asian Indians, etc. began to move in in the mid 1980's. Table 2 shows the diversity or distribution of Asian races. The six major races of Asians in Austin, in the order of quantities, are Asian Indians, Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, Filipino, and Japanese. There is a category of "other Asians" in the population study of US Census Bureau, as described above.


Austin is ranked in the third as to the cities or Metro's which have the most number of Asians in Texas. As shown in Tables 3, the City of Houston has the most number of Asians while Austin City is ranked the second. To compare among the Metro's, the Austin Metro is also the third one, next to those of Houston and Dallas. Texas, as a whole, is one of the states which have the most rapid growth of Asian population in the past twenty (20) years.

III. Contractors Business

1. Establishment of a Contractor Business

A great number of Asians own businesses in the Austin MSA. ACA estimated in 2005 (Reference 1) that there were about 800~1,000 Asians-owned businesses actively operated in the Austin MSA. This number has been roughly doubled to 1,500~2,000 in 2015. These businesses cover a variety of fields, include but not limited to professional firms, high-tech companies, food service operations, retail stores, and construction-related businesses. Some of the businesses depend on service contracts with the public agencies. Like any other business, "contractors" have to formulate an organization to start their services. An organization may be a proprietor, a partnership, a corporation, or a limited liability company. For details about the formation of an organization, one can search the web site of Texas Secretary of State, under "Business Filing" Section (Reference 5, SOS).

2. Purchasing Processes

Most agencies have procurement or purchasing programs. The City of Austin (COA), for example, has a solicitation process (Reference 6, COA). It issues purchase orders or bids such as invitation for bids (IFB) or request for quotations (RFQ); request for proposals (RFP), and request for qualifications (RFQS). The businesses or contractors respond to various types of bids to pursue a service contract. The selections have different criteria for different bidding processes.

An IFB selects the lowest priced, responsive and responsible bidder. On the other hand, An "IFB - Best Value" can pick one who presents the best value or quality of the products to the City. A "RFP" evaluates the bidding price of a firm and particularly, the solution or approach of its proposal and/or specification. RFQS are mainly for professionals, depending on the qualification and experience of the team, and possibly its knowledge of the approach to equivalent projects.

There is a negotiation process following the completion of a selection. A service contract can be implemented if the negotiation is successful. Otherwise it either goes to the second choice or issues a new bid.

2. Classification of Contractors

The City of Austin as well as some other agencies, classified their purchases into four (4) categories, including construction, professional service, non-professional service, and commodity (Reference 7, ACA). For the same token, vendors or contractors pursuing service contracts are corresponding to these 4 categories. "Constructors" are those who have skills in construction-related work and possess tools for implementing structural systems. This includes general contractors, specialty constructors, and licensed trade specialists such as mechanical contractor, plumber, and electrician (MPE contractors). "Professionals" are those with certifications or licenses from the governments, such as engineers, architects, and others who design or plan projects which include structures, utility operations, land development, etc. "Non-professionals" covers a variety of specialties including but not limited to scientists, data analysts, development planners, and computer-related personnel. "Commodity" refers to entities which sell products or materials to purchasing agencies.

Vendors can also be classified as general contractors (prime) and sub-contractors (subs). A general contractor pursues a bid for the entire project. The general contractor may contact specialty or minority contractors for specific jobs in this project. The contractors who take specific jobs in a project are sub-contractors.

3. Certifications for Minority Contractors

Several government agencies and private industries have minority vendor certification program. For example, the City of Austin, Texas has an ordinance and a corresponding minority certification program managed by the Small and Minority Business Resources, City of Austin (Reference 8, SMBR). The SMBR office can certify Asian contractors and/or businesses as Minority Business Enterprise (MBE), Women Business Enterprise (WBE), and/or Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE), based on their "socially and economically disadvantaged status" and other requirements. This certification also refers to some commodity codes that are associated with the specialties or experiences of the business enterprise. In the meantime, the State of Texas has a HUB program (Historically-Utilized Business) for minority vendor certification. When a business is certified as MBE, WBE, or DBE, the State program generally considers the business being also certified as HUB.

The major benefit of being certified as a minority vendor is to obtain better opportunities to participate in a project issued by the purchasing agencies. For example, "SMBR" has a compliance division to make sure and monitoring the participations of the certified minority vendors in the procurement processes for most of the City's projects. Certification also provides publicity to a business. When it is certified as a "Minority Vendor," the name of the business is in the lists of the certified vendors presented by the certification agency. The business may often receive solicitations from the prime contractors and purchasing agencies.

Table 4 shows the entities which accept and issue minority vendor certifications. Table 5 provides a list of agencies which have minority vendor programs and encourage the participations of the certified Asian contractors to participate in their procurement processes. Appendix A at the end of this paper presents the lists of the certified vendors, i.e., the lists of MBE/WBE and DBE. This Appendix of five pages (pages A1~A5) also classifies the certified vendors into different types of contractors.

4. Bids and Response to Bids

Agencies issue purchasing orders or bids to the public, encouraging registered vendors to participate in their procurement processes. As described before, these bids generally include IFB or RFQ; RFP, and RFQS. Vendors or contractors can respond to the bids in order to secure a service contract. Following is a description on how to respond to a bid. One important element is to attend a pre-bid conference in order to obtain a bid document and the contact information. A contractor should review the bid and submit required documents in time for different types of bid.

For IFB or RFQ:

- A bid sheet that specifies the total price for the project, and the price for each group of service or product. For each group, it lists the unit price, number of units, and the total amount of prices for this group.
- Other papers or forms that satisfy all requirements of the bid, such as reference sheet, nondiscrimination certification, compliance of minority vendor procurement program, and the bond and insurance requirements.
- If "Best Value" is in association with the IFB, the submission should include a description of the approach for implementing the project and the eventual quality of the products.

For RFP:

- An offer sheet, and a report of proposal or specification which covers the term, schedule, scope of work, methods for analyzing the subject or resolving the problem, and the cost allocation plan.
- Other papers or forms that satisfy all requirements of the request, such as insurance, work comp, non-discrimination certification, compliance of minority vendor procurement program, and other supplemental purchasing provisions.

For RFQS:

- A "Statement of qualification and interest or availability," which covers the qualification of the prime contractor, its experience related to the project, the management team and other personnel, and possibly a short description of the method or approach to the project.
- Other papers or forms that satisfy all requirements of the request, such as insurance, work comp, non-discrimination certification, compliance of minority vendor procurement program, and other supplemental purchasing provisions.

5. Service Providers in Austin MSA

There are various organizations which provide services to contractors. Table 6 is a list of these organizations and their contact information. Some of them sponsor conference and training sessions to individuals and businesses. Also, a contractor business can obtain procurement and technical information, as well as referral service from these organizations. In general, these organizations are good resources for contractors to gain information and/or assistance.

Asian Contractor Association (ACA) supports the "minority vendor" certification programs, and in turn, assists in the efforts of the certified Asian vendors such as MBE, WBE, DBE, HUB, etc. In general, ACA provides services to all Asian contracting businesses, including but not limited to constructors, engineers, architects, and specialty service contractors.

IV. Conclusions

This paper is one of a series of publications in order to benefit Asian vendors or contractors in the Austin metro area. These publications targeted procurement processes and technical issues. Asian contractors refer to engineers, architects, specialty services, and all types of constructors. Conclusions of this paper are drawn from the above discussions:

- Asian population in the Austin Metro area has increased in a dramatic manner in the past 20 years. There is a 6.8 percent of Asians among the populations within the limit of the City of Austin (2014 estimates).
- (2) A great number of Asians in the Austin Metro area own business. In particular, some of the businesses such as engineering and construction-related firms have registered with various public and private agencies, responding to their bids in order to pursue and secure service contracts with the agencies.

- (3) Most agencies have procurement or purchasing programs. They issue specific bids for purchase of services or products. These bids generally include but not limited to IFB, RFP, and RFQS. Each of these bids requires specific response from the registered vendors or general contractors, consisting of engineers, constructors, specialty service firms, etc.
- (4) Asian businesses or contractors can be certified as "minority vendors" with the local, state, federal, and private entities. Some agencies have a "minority vendors" program that requires the certified, "minority vendors" to be included in their procurement procedures. The certification programs provide a better opportunity for Asian contractors to participate in the projects issued by various agencies.
- (5) Contractors should learn and know how to respond to a bid. This study has provided basic information on what documents to be submitted to the purchasing agencies. Naturally, the submissions of a competitive offer of price, a specification or report which complies with the needs of certain projects, and any other required documents are essential for winning the selection in bidding.
